





To create the life-size figures, the church's construction crew cuts characters from 3/4" Marine grade ply-

wood, sands them, and applies primer. Once this groundwork is complete, the art team traces the patterns and brings each figure to life with vivid, beautiful colors. The transformation is truly exciting to witness.

During Christmas, more than 70 characters are displayed, each paired with scriptures that recount the story of Jesus from birth to crucifixion.





# TAX update

## THE OBBA AND YOUR TAXES: A GREEN VALLEY GUIDE FOR SENIORS (WITH A SMILE)

f you've been following the news from Washington (and let's be honest, most of us would rather be watching the hummingbirds in Madera Canyon), you may have heard about the new OBBA—the Optimized Budget and Benefits Act. Congress loves its acronyms, and this one is the latest to shake up how Uncle Sam keeps tabs on our wallets.

Don't worry, I won't drown you in legalese. Think of this article as your friendly tax-weather forecast: a light breeze of information, a sprinkling of humor, and hopefully not enough jargon to make you reach for the margarita mix before noon.

## **Bigger Standard Deduction** for Seniors

The OBBA made a change many retirees will cheer about: the standard deduction for those 65 and older is going up. That means more of your income is shielded from taxation without you having to itemize deductions (translation: fewer receipts to keep track of and less arguing with your shoebox full of Walgreens slips).

For a married couple filing jointly where both spouses are 65 or older, the increase could save several hundred dollars each year. That's a couple more dinners at your favorite Green Valley spot—or at least a few rounds of golf before it gets too hot out there.

#### Charitable Giving Simplified

If you're in the habit of giving to local charities—whether it's the animal shelter, your church, or the crew at the Green Valley White Elephant—the OBBA makes it easier.

There's now a "universal charitable deduction" that doesn't require itemizing. Translation: you can write off some giving even if you stick with the standard deduction. For many of us who like to support local causes but don't track every penny, this is a win-win.

#### **Energy Efficiency Incentives**

Thinking about upgrading your air conditioner (again)? The OBBA sweetened the pot for energy-efficient home improvements. Seniors living in sunny southern Arizona may find tax credits for installing better windows, solar panels, or energy-saving appliances.

Now, before you get visions of the IRS paying for your new hot tub in the backyard, keep in mind the credits are capped. Still, it's nice to know there's a little reward for keeping your electric bill from skyrocketing in July.

## Medical Expense Threshold Adjustment

Medical costs are no laughing matter—though if you don't laugh, you might cry. OBBA lowered the threshold for deducting medical expenses, meaning more of what you spend on doctors, prescriptions, and even hearing aids could count toward a deduction.

And let's face it: between co-pays, new glasses, and that "mystery ache" your doctor says is "just aging," this deduction will be one many of us can actually use.

#### So, What Should You Do?

- 1. Don't panic. Most of these changes are good news for seniors.
- 2. Check your withholdings. Make sure you're not giving Uncle Sam an interest-free loan.
- 3. Keep basic records. You don't need to hoard paper like a squirrel with pecans, but hold on to important tax-related documents



4. Ask for help. This is where a friendly CPA (hi, that's me) can walk you through what matters for your specific situation.

#### A Final Thought

Tax law changes come and go. (Remember when we were all worried about Y2K? The IRS survived that just fine.) The OBBA is the newest chapter, and while it's not

earth-shattering, it does offer some tangible benefits for retirees in southern Arizona.

So, pour yourself some iced tea, take a stroll around Desert Meadows Park, or head to the White Elephant for a little trea-

sure hunting, and rest easy knowing you don't have to figure it all out alone.

And remember: if you ever feel like the tax code was written in Martian, you're not wrong. But at Joseph Lessard, CPA PLLC, I promise to translate it into plain English—with maybe a joke or two along the way.



If you are interested in volunteering, please stop in for an application. Be sure to let us know you are a winter resident so we can place you in an appropriate position on a day that works for you.



## White Elephant Facility Report 2025

Another year has come and gone usual conversation of what the summer month's monsoon season will bring was on everyone's mind. The hot days brought wishes of clouds and rain to come cool us down. Thankfully with the weather we did receive, our building held up to the elements.

Prior to the monsoon season, we went ahead and did some preventative maintenance to our roof. Areas like the drain spouts, sections around our solar panel supports, and various spots that had the rubberized coating show signs of minor cracking. With the exception of these minor repairs, and this being my first year as the Facility Manager, I'm pleased to see just how well previous Facility Managers have attended to this building.

Another area of continued maintenance is to our HVAC system, one of the many systems in this building that we all have a close eye on. I don't want to feel what this place would be like if we lost that system. A big plus helping the White Ele-

phant to be a cool option for those here at the White Elephant. The hot summer mornings and afternoons for not only our customers, but our many volunteers who go above board to help keep this organization running.

> Speaking of systems we keep eyes on, the White Elephants "power plant" of 420 Photo Voltaic panels has continued to generate some impressive numbers. I say impressive because we did unfortunately lose 3 months of undocumented data. The reports I have been able to pull shows our quarterly figures in 40,000+ kWh (Kilowatt-hour). Had our report operating system been functional during those lost months of data, we would see a very different number. I did however get a rough estimate of what our panels could have reported by plugging in the weather patterns for those months. What was shown is that our panels potentially generated between 48,500 kWh - 52,000 kWh. This system is definitely a fantastic investment to the White Elephant.

goes out to all of you in the community who help us drive this organization forward in our mission to give back to the community. I'm happy and proud to be a part of the White Elephant and I hope to bring my skills to the table and keep this place up and running as they have for all these years.

## History of the White Elephant 1964-2025

nyone who lives in or visits Southern Arizona boasts about the White Elephant! It is often described as a tourist destination for having the greatest selection of gently used merchandise at the lowest prices. It even is a haven for resellers who make a living selling products they purchase at the store.

Shoppers looking for the best bargains in clothing, shoes, furniture, household items, linens, toys, holiday decorations, electronics, books, sporting goods, patio items and so much more can find them at the White Elephant. Everything is donated, tax-deductible and all proceeds go directly to the local community.

Since its inception in 1964, the Country Fair White Elephant has experienced many milestone events and transitions. The year 2025 has been no exception.

Beginning in January, Chris Cota took over the reins as the Thrift Store's General Manager, and Manny Jacques became its Facility Manager. Also, for the first time ever, two full-time truck department employees were hired to assist volunteers in picking up and delivering furniture and large appliances, which immediately increased store revenue.

In addition, beginning this summer, store sales escalated due to the newly installed in-store Boutique Department, making new and higher-end products available throughout the year. Previously, these items were sold only during recent special

events twice a year and at the "Midnight Madness Green Valley Style" sale which was conducted annually beginning in 2004 and ending in 2021 when the Board voted to discontinue the White Elephant Parade due to Pima County's Health Department regulations and higher costs.

"It is so encouraging to see all our dedicated volunteers and store management working together to make possible our mission of contributing to the Green Valley, Sahuarita and Southern Arizona communities," said Jim Luhring, 2025 Board Vice President. Jim will succeed Tom Cooke next year as Board President.

Over the years, the White Elephant has donated more than \$36 million to local youth groups, school districts, adult and child assistance programs, volunteer fire departments and hundreds of thousands in scholarships for local students.

Additionally, the White Elephant donates hundreds of boxes of usable but not salable, merchandise to various organizations every month.

In retrospect, there was no way the small group of community leaders in 1964 could predict how their first sale and fair would successfully evolve over the next 61 years! The \$146.20 they earned was donated to the Friends of the Library to purchase a typewriter and table and chairs. They accomplished their primary goals to promote good fellowship and to provide a means for local residents to get better acquainted. In doing so, they created a legacy!

In 1980, the Country Fair Board leased land from Pima County in the Government Center at 601 N. La Canada Drive to build a 3,000 square foot year-round store that opened for business the following year. The first building was remodeled and expanded five times.

The current White Elephant
Thrift Store was completed,
and a Grand Opening was held on
October 7, 2009. It occupies 34,400
square feet including 17,200 square
feet of new space and 17,200 square
feet of remodeled space. It is open
Monday through Saturday from
9am to noon and has gone "green"
with a dedicated recycling program
and solar panels on the roof to supply electricity for the building.

The successful history of the White Elephant would not be possible

## **Santa Rita Fire Corps**

The Mission of the Santa Rita Fire Corps is to provide Prevention and Safety Services to our Community that result in Superior Customer Satisfaction and Enhance the Effectiveness of the Santa Rita Fire District. It started in 2006 to help the Fire District with day-to-day, non-emergent calls, such as desert pests and chirping smoke alarms. Today, Fire Corps serves Green Valley and the Town of Sahuarita. It has five-day-per-week coverage for our Smoke Alarm Battery and Replacement Program, monitoring and replacing batteries in residential smoke alarms, installing new A/C powered, battery back-up smoke alarms, and installing residential lock boxes.

The White Elephant Country Fair grants have been instrumental to helping the Santa Rita Fire Corps and our volunteers accomplish our mission. In 2024, the donation of \$21,000 assisted towards the purchase of a new 2025 Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck. This truck is utilized 5 days a week to help with our lockbox program where volunteers will install an emergency access lockbox, change keys as needed, and

periodically come and check lockboxes installed in previous years to ensure they are properly functioning. Since 2006 the White Elephant has assisted us with three grants towards purchasing vehicles. ## Over the Past 60 Years the CFWE has Granted a Total of \$36.7 Million to Organizations in Green Valley, Sahuarita & Surrounding Areas

The White Elephant Contribution Committee spend many hours reading, discussing and discerning applications for grants along with visitations to selective grant recipients from year to year. Members of the committee are honored and privileged to be part of the White Elephant Organization where the missions is to "give back to the community".

This year, 146 applications were mailed to schools and organizations and 131 have been received back for review. Last December, the White Elephant distributed 1.6 million with additional \$137,000 towards the White Elephant Scholarship Foundation.

The White Elephant has distributed over 4.8 million in the last 3 years to schools and organizations in the Pima and Santa Cruz Coun-

ty. Separately, \$347,000 was distributed from the White Elephant Scholarship Foundation to selective high school seniors in the Sahuarita school district.

The requests for grants vary from schools and organizations. Many requests from schools are for computers, field trips, clothing, books, staff appreciation, playground equipment and supplies.

One unusual request from an elementary school asked for a grant purchase window shades. The shades were needed to keep students focused on school instructions instead of distraction from outside sources. This was happily granted and a welcome relief from thankful teachers.

Grants to the organizations are organized in various categories. These include grants to Youth Organizations, Adult and Child Assistance, Community Arts Support, Area Nature Study and Preservation, National Diseases, and Rural Fire Districts.

One organization offers classes in aviation to elementary and highschool students in grades 5-12. Students are motivated to "reach new heights" in their academic and personal life through aviation. Upon a successful 9-week course, students have the opportunity to fly a small aircraft. One of the organization instructors said, "if you see a small plane flying over Green Valley, it possibly could be a grade school student"!



## CFWE Recycling Keeps Materials Out of the Landfill

came across this article by Chris Cota about our volunteer, Glen Pfefferkorn who puts in a tremendous amount of time categorizing and processing items that we send to the recycling yard. It's worth sharing again.

Glen Pfefferkorn grew up on a farm in Eastern Oregon. He remembers occasional trips to the landfill. Dad often exchanged what we didn't need for items others were dumping. "Never know when we might use this, dad would say."

After earning an accounting degree and spending three years in the army, he worked thirty years with the Oregon Department of Revenue. Tax auditor, accounting supervisor, management analyst and hearings officer is among the titles he earned.

He spent leisure hours gardening and growing flowers and plants. At one time, Sunday was spent nurturing a collection of over 100 house plants. Then he discovered back-

packing and every weekend was another trip into the Cascade Mountains.

In 1982 he encountered llamas at a fair. Perfect packing companion and like potato chips you can't have just one. When his first llama baby needed medical care, a new friendship started with the Veterinary College at Oregon State Universi-

ty. He and his spouse endowed a scholarship to assist veterinary students and endowed the only professorship in the world dedicated to llama and alpaca medical research. He still serves as a director of a Foundation supporting the vet college.

The herd flourished and in 1998 he moved 80 llamas from his ten-acre suburban plot to a fortysix-acre former cattle ranch. By then, retired from office work, he traded eight-hour days for 12-14 hour days doing what he enjoyed most, caring for a livestock herd which grew to 120 animals.

Not one to be a name on a roster, he helped form a local llama association, served as a director on a national association and introduced llamas to the local county and Oregon State Fair. He volunteered as a superintendent for almost twenty years, organized many shows and dedicated hours coaching 4-H kids and judging county fair projects.

Health required a change. In 2004 he purchased a small house in Green Valley. In 2009 he chose volunteering at the White Elephant to fill empty hours. Sorting donations was his first assignment. Then he moved up to redirecting unsalable items from the dumpster to the recycle yard. Full circle back to the landfill.

Three days each week he separates metal from plastic sorting copper, brass, aluminum, steel, Christmas lights, electric cords and electric motors for transporting to the recycle center. Glen can be seen "dumpster diving" when he sees recyclable items in the dumpster. Sales annually pay for or exceed the maintenance expenses of the two "White Elephant" trucks seen about Green Valley. His time and contribution to the White Elephant is greatly appreciated.



hite Elephant volunteers are some of the most dedicated people I've met.


Here at the Elephant, we have folks who have just started their journey with us and some who have been here for many years.





## The White Elephant Summer Student Work Program

The summer of 2025 brought begins. the return of the White Elephant's very specialized program for Sahuarita School District students. The Summer Student Work Program which began in June of 2006, is a life-skills program that gives students, who are age 14 and older who attend a Sahuarita middle school or high school, the opportunity to work at the White Elephant for an 8-week program during the months of June and July.


Students are notified that the program is available and that application packets can be picked up at their school office right around spring break time. The students then have about two weeks to return their completed application packet to the school and the process


The following qualifications must be met in order to be considered for the program:

- Attend a panel interview with White Elephant management.
- Agree to the work program requirements and have parental permission to participate.
- Be available to work the entire 8-week program.
- Attend orientation and agree to all rules & regulations as out-

lined in the Student Handbook.



Our truckers are no strangers to early mornings and heavy lifting, which is why finding volunteer truckers can be a job in itself. We are very fortunate to have our teams of truckers going out into the community on a daily basis, however we are always looking

to add a few more who are able to do the heavy lifting and don't mind the early mornings to our volunteer roster. Our truckers are going out each day in the community to pick up donated items that our community residents graciously donate to the White Elephant Thrift Store. They also make deliveries of purchases to residents that have no other way of getting their purchased item to their homes.

Our White Elephant trucks go out 5 days a week. Keeping our trucks running and up to date on maintenance schedules is the job of our volunteer truck manager George Schmidt. George is in charge of scheduling regular service for our trucks, as well as any repairs that might need to be done in order to keep our trucks on the road. George also keeps the trucks clean and stocked with the equipment that helps truckers with the daily job of picking up donations of furniture and large appliances, as well as delivering purchases of large items to our local customers.

Our truckers job doesn't stop at the front door to a residence. Our truckers typically move furniture in or out of homes where the resident just cannot do it on their own. The White Elephant is honored to say that we receive numerous calls, letters and emails from local donors paying compliments

to the great job that our truckers do.

Here are a few excerpts from a few different letters that we received:

"I can't praise the crew enough for the pickup they did for me this morning, which was the unsold items from an estate sale I handled. They arrived at the scheduled time they said they would, were so courteous as well as professional, and then gone on to their next pickup. They really work hard doing what they do. My compliments and appreciation are directed to all of the daily truck crews. They have my thanks!"

"The 2 gentlemen that came to deliver my double recliner sofa, which was not a light piece of furniture, did a fantastic job getting it in my home without any damages to my home. They were very friendly and professional and I can't stress enough how much of a great job these 2 guys did. Once they were done with me they went off to the next location with smiling faces. Those truckers at the White Elephant do a wonderful job and I know when I buy something at the White Elephant that I can't take home myself, I can count on the White Elephant truckers to get it to my home with no problems."

Here are some of the guidelines for becoming a White Elephant volunteer:

The White Elephant is always in need of volunteers. We especially need individuals who are able to lift at least 30-50 pounds to work on our trucks and in our Receiving department. Our truck crew volunteers must be able to lift at least 50 pounds and work 6:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Other volunteer opportunities are also available at this time on various days of the week. The minimum work commitment is 4 hours per week, one day a week, Monday through Saturday. Morning shifts are available. Volunteer applications are available from cashiers during store hours and in the donation drop-off area of the building. Please complete your application and return it to the White Elephant. Once your application is received, you will be contacted to start the process to get you started as a White Elephant volunteer! If you have any questions about volunteering at the White Elephant, please contact the store directly at (520) 625-4119. We hope you'll consider being a White Elephant Volunteer! And remember, people who volunteer on a regular basis have a healthier outlook on life. They






## White Elephant Facebook Page Update


price each day. Plus, they get to see some of their favorite volunteers.

# Welcome to the White Elephant's Unique Boutique

he Country Fair White Elephant welcomes thousands of shoppers each month, many looking for gently used clothing, shoes, housewares, appliances, tools and furniture, as well as used books, art, jewelry, collectibles and more.

Almost everyone is looking for bargains these days and there's no shortage of incredible deals throughout the store. As the old saying goes, "One person's trash can be another's treasure."

According to recent retail market reports, second-hand fashion has experienced a remarkable rise. The increasing popularity of second-hand clothes highlights a shift in consumer attitudes, emphasizing the importance of reusing and extending the lifespan of clothing. The second-hand clothing industry is projected to grow about three times faster than the overall apparel market.

While thrift stores are nothing new, they're becoming more popular as shoppers deal with rising costs of living and in some cases, earn a living as resellers.

Lucky for White Elephant shoppers, the opportunity to buy better quality clothing, shoes and accessories, including many with the original price tags still attached, is now possible with the opening the White Elephant's Unique Boutique.

One of the thrift store's managers and longtime volunteer, Gail Bush, planted the seed for the boutique with months of brainstorming, discussion, and planning with the White Elephant's store committee. The group met with White Elephant store manager, Chris Cota and facilities manager, Manny Jacques, to finalize the location of the new sale's area. It was decided that the boutique would be built next to the store's existing dressing rooms.

Jacques designed and constructed the special addition using industrial metal frames that form the perimeter of the sales area and black rectangular shelving, giving the boutique a sleek modern appearance. He added a brightly colored whimsical carpet providing the boutique with

a splash of inviting color.

The White Elephant's Unique Boutique opened on July 21 with a weeklong grand opening and excited crowds eager to see what the boutique had to offer. Volunteer manager, Regina Ford took on the challenge of sorting and pricing the boutique inventory which is housed in a special work area before it makes it to the sales floor.

"With the help of so many of the volunteers in the various departments, as well as the other managers setting things aside for the boutique, I sorted and priced hundreds of items in time for the opening day," Ford says. "It's surprising at the amount of clothing, shoes and accessories that are donated to the White Elephant with the price tags still attached. Brand new things come in all the time."

Ford says that the inventory "is an unknown and changes all the time" since all the items the White Elephant sells are donated from the public

"I've had customers ask me if I have a different size of an item they've tried on," Ford says. "Sadly, I have to tell them the pair of pants they are holding was donated and the only pair we have in the store. There ar-

en't any more in stock."

Not everything donated to the White Elephant is used. Donations of boxes and bags of new clothing is not uncommon.

"I have priced dozens and dozens of new dresses in every size imaginable and all brand new," Ford says. "I often leave the original price tag on the items so the

customer can see for themslves what a bargain they are getting with White Elephant prices."

You may find Talbots, Chico's, Calvin Klein, Banana Republic, Soft Surroundings, Sundance and Ralph Lauren clothing that have never been worn.

"I imagine these higher-end clothes were hanging in someone's closet or they were liquidated from a retail store until they were eventually donated," Ford says.

The grand opening sale featured furs, leather belts and boots, unique vin-

tage clothing, a selection of men's and women's leather jackets, as well as Harley Davidson motorcycle chaps and more than 25 brand new handbags.

"I find plenty of wonderful things to add to the boutique replacing the things that sell," Ford says. "We have generous donors and loyal customers so everything goes full circle."

The Country Fair White Elephant donates the money it makes from the sale of donated goods to local non-profit organizations, schools, and scholarship programs in the Southern Arizona communities of Green Valley, Sahuarita, and the Santa Cruz Valley. The thrift store operates with hundreds of volunteers, which helps maximize the amount of money given back to the community.

"If you want to be part of the volunteer team, please pick up an application at the White Elephant," Ford says. "I could use some more boutique treasure hunters and there are plenty of other volunteer opportunities available."

## WHEN YOU NEED IT WILL IT BE THERE?

hroughout my years of training, I would hear my mentors say that good health isn't built in a day—it's built day by day. A workout. A balanced meal. Choosing water instead of soda. Going to bed on time. Each of these small actions adds up.

Each decision is a promise to yourself, your present and future health. These "mundane" daily decisions *will* fortify you against illness, rapid aging, and a sputtering decline of health. Or can accelerate the opposite.

Notice the word will.

At some point, stress *will* hit your body. A cold will make its way through the office. An injury will test your ability to recover. Life will demand more energy than you thought you had. And in that moment, your body will either have the strength to meet the challenge. Overcome the obstacle in the path. Or...it won't.

Health stamina, a strong immune system, capacity to recover – or simplified, *resilience* – is not built in the moment of crisis. It is built and accumulated in the weeks, months, and years leading up to that moment.

The work to fortify yourself will either have been done...or not. That's why your present health is not *really* the current state of your health. Let me explain.

A strong and healthy body in the present day is a lagging indicator of years, even decades, of daily choices. It is the harvest of habits planted long ago.

Each time you need a strong response from your immune system, a *quick* rebound back from stress, or to overcome a painful injury, or situation, such as arthritis. This is where you can draw from the bank of health you've built.

## When you need your health, will it be there?

Nothing comes from nowhere. Everything is proof of where the work was done—or wasn't. And nowhere is this truer than with health.

Which brings us to a truth most people trip over: If we see the

pursuit of health as a cost, it will ultimately become your greatest liability.

We've all had "a friend" at some point say that their health is their #1 asset. But does the sound match the actions of what you see them doing to build and protect that health?

Here's the reframe exercise you can use today – to help them – that may be useful to you as well:

**Step 1:** Think about the time, money, and the attention you put into your health the same way you think about contributions to a retirement account.

**Step 2:** Use your future goals to drive your present actions. (Rather than believe your past, or present, dictates your future)

Step 3: Be brutally honest with yourself when it comes to your daily investment in your health.

With this:

- Every session of movement is a deposit.
- Every good night's sleep accrues interest.
- Every nourishing meal compounds over time.
- Every avoidance of the "negative normal" retains resources

And much like financial wealth, the earlier and more consistently you invest, the greater the returns will be for you later in life.

The final nugget for this new way of looking at your health...

Know that the U.S. healthcare system isn't designed to make you healthy. Much like the U.S. banking system is not designed to make you wealthy. They're designed to benefit large corporate entities, not the consumer.

Sure, your healthcare insurance policy will step in when you're already sick, but rarely will it cover the proactive, health-optimizing steps that keep you thriving in the first place. The sooner you just accept that, the sooner you can put your attention on the gap in your health that you can control.

Because if your security for your health is tied only to a "just in case" *insurance* policy you'll likely be perpetually disappointed. On the other hand, if you focus on building and carrying a daily *assurance* policy, i.e. the confidence that comes from knowing your daily habits are compounding into health, strength, resilience, and vitality as you age, you'll likely be way more delighted in time.

So, my friend, the question becomes:

## Are you treating your health like an expense to minimize, or an asset to maximize?

Because nothing pays dividends like the ability to live longer, move easier, think clearer, and show up fully for the people and work you care about.

## The ROI of health isn't just years added to your life—its life added to your years.

Because at the end of your life, many would deploy every last asset in their investment portfolio to have a little more time with the ones they love.

Wouldn't you?

What is your (less than optimal) health costing you right now? The experiences, less experienced. Daily activities, less active. A life of less? Or a life of more, on your terms.

If you've read this far, I'll leave you with one final piece of advice.

Don't delay.

Today, commit to finding the right physician and healthcare team that is rooting for you to succeed – and is equipped to guide you through the process – rather than shrugging off your goals as impossible.

"You never change things by fighting the existing reality. To change something, build a new model that makes the existing model obsolete." – Buckminster Fuller

That is the mindset for building your best health.

## Come Find Your Roots!

he Southern Arizona Genealogy Society (SAGS) in Green Valley is here to help you, and we have been doing so for 50 years, thanks to Green Valley resident Allen Ogden!

In 1976 Allen saw the need for a genealogy group in Green Valley so he put the word out, and 15 people came to the first meeting! The Society was established on May 18, 1977. Four officers were elected, and meetings were held September through May with dues of \$3.00 a year.

In September 1977 the members voted to start a club library and it has grown from a bookshelf in the home of Dr. Mary Hall in Villas West to the current 3,500 Green Valley-Sahuarita Genealogy Library, a project of SAGS and LaPosada. The library is located in the Posada Java building on the campus of LaPosada.

Club membership was 19 in 1977 and at the end of 1983 we had 80 members. In 1994 a newsletter was devel-

oped, and today our "Past Tracks" newsletter continues to be published monthly, October through May of each year. In 2018 the face of the Society changed, and a new logo, club colors (copper and turquoise) and a website

were developed. Also, we had a new name, Southern Arizona Genealogy Society (SAGS). In 2020 our membership approached over 300, and we started offering educational classes, special interest groups (SIGS), workshops, seminars, webinars and more!

Thanks to Allen and the many people who came after him, today we continue to help people find their roots! Interested in finding your roots??? We meet monthly, October through May. # Why Healthy Feet are Important to Enjoying a Good Life

lmost everything you do from the time you get out of bed until you get back to sleep requires you to use your feet. Most people don't think about what healthy feet really mean to your overall well-being.

Feet have 26 bones, over 100 muscles, tendons and ligaments working together to support weight and enable movement. It is notable to know that there are at least 50 tendons and ligaments that help support your foot and enable you to walk.

Every time you take a step three things occur while weight is on your foot. A heel strike (supinated position) happens first and is a stiff part of taking a step, slightly striking on the outside of the heel. This impact is absorbed through the fat pads in your heel and the heel bone (calcaneus), the biggest bone in your feet.

Secondly is the midstance phase (pronated position). When your foot is in full contact, this absorbs step shock and absorbs vibrations that can reduce stress on your knees, hip and back. The midstance phase is also when your feet adapt to the terrain you walk on.

Finally, the toe off phase (supinated position), this is when your heal lifts, stiffening up your foot, bending at the ball of your feet to create a stiff lever to push you forward.

Your feet have a delicate balance in the way they work with all those fore mentioned muscles, tendons and ligaments to support you every step of the way. Whether simply walking around or being active in sports or exercise, your feet are crucial to living a life of quality.

As we use our feet, the supportive structures tend to change and sometimes breakdown causing us to do what is called over-pronate or over-supinate. This can cause your feet to change the alignment of the bone structure and decrease the healthy biomechanics of your feet. Your feet require a balance of both supination and pronation, or pain in your feet can start with minor symptoms that can eventually start to affect your knees, hips, back, leg muscles, ligaments around your knees and hips as well as decreased balance and stability.

Over-pronated feet or lower arches can affect your heel, arch, create bunions and put stress on the inside and front of your knees to name few common problems.

Over-supinated feet

can create pressure on the outside of your feet that contribute to bunionettes or tailors bunions, stress on tendons on the outside of the foot that stress your calve muscles, pain on the outsides of your knees, a tight IT band (side of your leg, tightened greater trochanter ligament (in your hip area) as well as a loss of lateral ankle stability that can affect balance and stability.

Uneven breakdown of your feet can also create hip and back problems by creating alignment issues of your





# Building Connections, Celebrating Progress, and Moving Forward

s Mayor of Sahuarita, I'm proud to say that 2025 was a year of great progress for our community—and more opportunities are on the horizon. Our town is strong because of the connections we've built. We are shaping a future that is safe, vibrant, and filled with opportunities for all generations.

For many of us who have lived here for years—me included—what we value most are the qualities that make life in Sahuarita special: safety, community spirit, and a sense of belonging. That's why I want to share some highlights of what we accomplished in 2025, and what you can expect as we move forward in 2026.

#### **Safety First**

Public safety remains one of our highest priorities, and 2025 brought important advancements. Sahuarita Police Department officers received advanced leadership training, and two of our own were honored by community members for outstanding service. These investments that Sahuarita ensure continues to be one of the Top 5 Safest Cities in Arizona—a point of pride for all of us.

In 2026, we will begin the expansion of our Police

Department building, adding space for labs, evidence storage, secure parking, and new training facilities. These upgrades will give our officers the tools they need to serve a growing community, while also reinforcing the sense of safety that residents have come to expect.

Traffic safety is another area of focus. A new traffic signal at Walden Grove High School will make the intersection safer for young drivers, and Public Works will repair sidewalks, improve pedestrian crossings with audible signals, and replace nearly 500 street signs for better visibility. These updates benefit all residents whether they are at home or on the road.

## **Business Development and Economic Growth**

A thriving economy benefits everyone. In 2025, we welcomed new businesses such as Burlington, Pima Heart, and El Herradero, and Boot Barn, adding services and shopping options close to home. Through the Grow in Sahuarita program, nearly



90 entrepreneurs received over 400 hours of coaching to help their businesses grow and succeed.

Looking ahead, 2026 will be an exciting year for economic development. We will complete our 10-year General Plan update, shaping how and where our community grows. Work will begin on the Parcel 30 vi-

At the same time, we are continuing discussions with the Phoenix Zoo about the possibility of a regional safari park—a project that would bring visitors, jobs, and cultural opportunities to our

These business and development initiatives mean more conveniences, new dining and

niences, new dining and entertainment options, and a stronger local economy that supports property values and quality of life.

## Community Engagement and Belonging

Sahuarita is known for its community spirit, and 2025 was no exception. We opened the Anamax Splash Pad and the La Villita Community Center, both of which quickly be-

came centers of activity. La Villita alone increased our recreation program

capacity by 50%, offering everything from indoor pickleball to expanded youth programs.

Signature events have continued to grow. Fiesta Sahuarita drew record crowds with music, food, and entertainment for all ages, while Winterfest earned a state award for Outstanding Special Event. These events bring neighbors together and create a sense of belonging that is so important for our town.

In 2026, we will keep building on that momentum. Our three signature events—Fiesta Sahuarita, Stars & Stripes, and Winterfest—will each return, and we will bring a new fall Oktoberfest event to Sahuarita with the Southern Arizona Arts & Cultural Alliance.

top national priority by the Army Corps of Engineers. Funding could begin as early as 2026, starting with feasibility studies that will lead to cleanup and, eventually, safe and sustainable development. This progress is the result of years of persistence and strong partnerships—and it represents a major opportunity for our community's long-term growth.

We are also continuing our role in regional transportation planning through RTANext, a proposed 20-year plan that would invest \$2.46 billion in projects across the region. If approved by voters, this plan would fund safer roads, improve mobility, and support economic growth. For Sahuarita, it means better connections to the region and stronger opportunities for residents and businesses alike.

#### **Connections Sustain Us**

As we reflect on 2025 and look ahead to 2026, one theme comes through clearly: connections. The connections between residents and their neighborhoods. The partnerships with schools, HOAs, and community organizations. The regional and national ties that bring investment and resources to our town.

These connections are what make Sahuarita thrive. They ensure our community remains safe, vibrant, and full of opportunity for all generations. I'm grateful to serve
